



WHAT IS THE ZOA COMMITTEE DOING?

Extracts from the minutes By Secretary: Joy Homewood With the end of the season in sight, this has been a quieter time for the Committee. However some important matters have been discussed, and work is still going on behind the scenes to complete the testing of the aluminium mast. This task has now been taken on by the President, since Murray

Sargisson has completed his part in the venture.

Efforts are also being made to find someone to make wooden masts in the North Island. The question of new hulls has also been raised. Ian Cook has been too busy to supply any this season, so another boat builder may be required. We are told that the Christchurch boat builder is doing a good job, but has used a different wood, namely Kahikatea. There was some doubt as to its suitability and acceptability, but the committee decided to endorse its use on this occasion.

Negotiations are also under way for a venue for the 1985 Nationals. Several clubs have been approached including Hamilton and French Bay. Taupo have declined to hold this event, as they felt it would be difficult to run a contest of that length.

We were sorry to learn that one of our newer committee members, Alan Retter, has gone to live in Australia. However, he has not sold his boat. A friend is sailing it in his absence, so he seems to intend joining us again in the not too distant future.


One issue which has occupied the committee over the last few months, is the \$5 Federation levy on all entrants in national contests. Lately we have been made aware of increasing support in our opposition to this levy. Accordingly, we have written to many class associations who will also be affected, seeking their support. We intend to submit a remit on the subject at the next Federation A.G.M.

With our own A.G.M. coming up in a few months, it's time to think of our next committee. There must be plenty of Zephyr owners with great potential just waiting to be asked! Hopefully the South Island owners are remembering the suggestion made by John Morrison that perhaps it's their turn to organize the class.

Meantime we hope that the draft of the new rules will be accepted and instituted soon.

SAWDUST, WOODCHIPS & PAINT PEELINGS By Zephuros

Well, the sawdust has really been piling up in Christchurch lately with another three boats off the mould down there. As you will see elsewhere these are now being vacuum moulded and by all reports are to a very high standard. The same can't be said for the

North Island where construction seems to be remaining at a standstill.

Our argument with the Federation is rumbling along with the Secretary of the Federation seemingly agreeing with most of our case. Funny how the English language can have such a diverse interpretation. The 3.7 class has come out strongly in support of our proposals as has the Catamaran Association and Sunburst owners.

Our new boatbeilder, Ian Franklin, has completed three new Zephyr hults now so has worked out prices for completion to various stages. I've enclosed a price list and a note he has prepared on his construction method which I hope you can publish in WEST WIND. He has sold two of the hulls he has built and has made a very good job of them. His vacuum bag method of construction brings the skins down very tight and smooth and without any of the mess left when staples are used. We are very pleased that he has taken over the mould and with the job he is making. Anyone wanting a hull should order through Rema Maynard, 5 Cliff St, Christchurch 8 (Secretary Canterbury Z.O.A.)

Austin Ebert No. 304, Hustle

Sir.

Our Zephyr hulls are built of three skins of kahikatea (white pine) using the vacuum bag moulding method. This is probably the first time in New Zealand that a wooden cold moulded class yacht has been built in this manner. This moulding method makes a very tight hull with perfect bonding between layers, eliminates stapling, and allows wider planks to be used than is advisable when cold moulding in the traditional manner, thus cutting down on labour costs. Other good aspects of the vacuum bag method of cold moulding are that there is very little fairing of the skins to be done once the vacuum bag is removed and also each boat is identical as the shell is always held hard on the mould as each layer is vacuumed.

We will build Zephyrs to any stage from the minimum allowed to completely finished yachts ready to race. Our price list itemizes Zephyr hulls at various stages of construction and the parts that we can supply.

Zephyr is a traditional New Zealand class built by traditional methods which makes new boats relatively expensive but ensures a good resale value for existing boats. The Zephyr has survived many years of extreme competition from modern designs. It has managed to attract many of the country's top yachtsmen who have enjoyed years of successful racing. This is due to good sensible administration, a minimum of rules and most important the Z.O.A. has kept a firm hand on the use of more exotic building materials ensuring that older boats stay competitive.

We have an enthusiastic team of boatbuilders who enjoy their work and we feel we can help the class by offering a service that Zephyr owners have not enjoyed before.



FBBC will arrange billets if required but prior notice by 30.10.84 is necessary.


To conclude the contest a prizegiving - social - dance will be held on 12.1.85 commencing 7.30 p.m.
