## WHAT IS THE ZOA COMMITTEE DOING?

The new 2.0.A. committee is determined to try and stimulate renewed interest in the Zephyr class in the Auckland area, particularly on the Waitemata Harbour. We have all read and some have seen how popular the class has become in the Canterbury area. Many of their new owners are in the 30+ age range

and are either returning to sailing after a spell or changing from a boat like the Sunburst after the family has grown. The Laser class is too physically demanding for most of us and the Europe Dinghy suits lighter skippers around ten and a half stone.

The Zephyr, although now some 28 years old in design, is still a very attractive and pleasant boat to sail. Unfortunately the timber spars whilst aesthetically appealing and functional (if you have a good one) are now "dating" the class and many prospective buyers of second hand boats and new hulls in the Auckland area have chosen other classes to sail because of this issue. Just as terylene replaced cotton sails in the early 1950's, so has aluminium replaced timber masts in the 1970's.

The Zephyr class is close to extinction in the Auckland area with less than five boats sailing regularly within 25 km of Auckland city. There should be at least fifty at two or three venues! It is time to present a modern up-to-date Zephyr to the sailing public and all owners will be asked to support rule changes in the next issue of WEST WIND allowing aluminium masts and Cunningham holes. Why should we have to use sliding goosenecks, uphauls (which in the old rules were never allowed for anyway) and downhauls to control draught when the simple Cunningham is far more effective, less expensive, and safer? A freely sliding gooseneck does not allow the kicking strap to work effectively and in my opinion should not be permitted. The answer is the Cunningham hole as used by all racing yachts and existing sails can be easily modified.

Discussions with mast manufacturers and boat trials are continuing with aluminium spars. The Aitcheson mast as used on the Mistral has proved to be too stiff in the top section and currently I am evaluating a 2 1/4 inch tapered Baverstock section in Gazelle; together with a new Boyd and McMaster sail (current sail pattern) fitted with a Cunningham hole. One day's testing in a variety of wind conditions has indicated that this mast could be close to what we are looking for. That is, an aluminium mast with performance similar to a good timber mast without extras such as spreaders, etc. It is likely that the new rule proposal will state the type of extrusion (e.g. Baverstock 2 1/4"), the length and amount of taper and minimum weight. We welcome owners' comments on the masts and sails and request you write to the Secretary, 2.O.A., Gary Adams, 32 Barron Drive, Green Bay, Auckland.

There has been some dissatisfaction in the past about oad setting sails. Previous 2.0.A. committees, and in particular Max Walker, have done a tremendous amount of work to improve the sail through quality control standards and small changes such as tightening the leech. It has been suggested that the Mistral sail which is now cut to a new pattern should be evaluated. Although this sail sets better in the tack it is designed for a two sail, two person boat and consequently is flat in the lower section and full up top. This is not therefore necessarily the ideal sail for the Zephyr, and Boyd and McMaster recommend fastening the tack about 20 mm back from the usual position to reduce creasing in this area. No two sails will ever be exactly alike even though from the same sailmaker. By staying with Boyd and McMaster and the one pattern over the years the class has avoided the expensive fashion trends evidenced in other classes. Old sails have proven to be as competitive as new ones.

The Z.O.A. is pleased that Ian Franklin, a boat builder in Christchurch, is continuing to build hulls. This year eight hulls have been vacuumed bagged on the mould originally built by the Canterbury owners. The workmanship and quality of these hulls is very high. Ian flew one of his hulls to Auckland for the Boat Show in October and it created a great deal of interest. If you know of anyone wanting a new hull please ask them to contact the Z.O.A. Secretary (Gary Adams - phone Auckland 873-466). French Bay Boating Club, Titirangi, Auckland is the venue for the National Championships in January. The event will be run to the usual very high standard and all owners participating and their families can look forward to a very pleasant and enjoyable sailing/holiday. ### Christchurch Capers

Race 2. Start vicinity "Mortens" moderate N.E. larger fleet than race 1. Ken Mayner pulled away to a good lead soon after the start. The minor places changed many times on the first beat.

After the first triangle, Ken Maynard had a handy lead over John Morrison. At the end of the second triangle these two carried their own wind to open up a big gap back to the main bunch.

The wind lightened and Ken forgot about the last lap of the course and wondered why the officials did not flag him in but a call from you know who in second place told him of the other round to do, so away they went together. At the bottom mark the wind died and came in fresh from the N.W. giving Victoria and Moana a speedy run to the finish, Victoria just getting the gun after being second for most of the race.

#### WEDDING BELLS




