## **2023 –2024 SEASON END** PRESIDENT'S REPORT **Matt Mitchell**

We've had a quiet year. Not a lot to report, apart from the ongoing good work of our volunteers. We've had a successful year selling masts, booms, sails and boats. We've managed to spread a few spars to the regions, so we have spares available. We've sold our last glass boat. Given the economic situation we're not in a hurry to order four more hulls we'll wait for two firm orders. Hulls have been a roaring success - it's gone better than anyone could have imagined, 17 built and sold.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT **Brian Peet**

From an administrative perspective, this season was another stable year with great leadership by Matt Mitchell, professional financial management from Tony Miller and enthusiastic support by the Exec. Once again Chief Measurer Graeme Robinson provided high quality, invaluable and independent advice to the Exec. The six weekly Exec meetings featured constructive discussions followed by sensible fact-based decision making.

For many in the class, the season highlight was the Lyttelton nationals, which unfolded as a most interesting, enjoyable event at one of NZ's premier sailing locations. John Boraston and his team of willing, cheerful volunteers created an organisational framework that enabled the event to run as close to clockwork as the weather would allow. Many thanks to the entire CZOA.

There has been a late change to the 2024 Nationals results with Steve Pyatt awarded average points after a YNZ appeals hearing. He'd been incorrectly informed by a pin end race official he was OCS and required to stand down from the race. This was despite the RO calling "All Clear". The pin-end boat's radio volume was set low, so the RO's call wasn't heard. Average points moved Steve from 11<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup>.

## TREASURER'S REPORT **Tony Miller**

#### **Financial**

Another good year for the class, with strong revenue from subs, sails, hulls and masts.

Mackay GRP hulls - three sold during the year, one sold after balance date. Total of 17 glass hulls sold since 2021. In the last season 16 sails, 15 masts and 9 booms were sold.

#### **Spars & Rigging**

We have used the first batch of our own extrusions. Quality of our masts continues to be excellent. 33 masts produced during the past year [54 since ZOA took over production]. We now have ZOA stock of masts in all the main centres with 18 stock masts spread around NZ. As this represents over one year of sales, so we plan to produce a further extrusion run in 2025.

#### Sails

Four in stock at Doyle's with a batch of 10 due in September.

Subs – 146 members. The centralised system is working well. It is recommended that the current sub of \$55 (\$20 Regional, \$35 ZOA) remains for 2024/5.

#### Summary

The Zephyr class is now in a good financial position in part due to sales of masts and the Mackay glass hulls. Many of the glass hulls have been sold to sailors new to the class, thus ensuring the continued growth of the class. It is pleasing to see some full GRP Zephyrs have resold at firm prices. Wooden Zephyrs continue to sell - good ones are still hard to find.

#### **REGIONAL REPORTS**

#### **CANTERBURY—John Boraston**

The title of our association is starting to become a bit misleading with boat and sailor membership now spanning across the South Island. During the season we gained a new member from Wanaka and Phil Quinn has been seen plenty of times further north in the South Island joining in on our events. Welcome Phil, we hope to get a crowd of us down your way this coming season. The other fleets based in Canterbury, Nelson and Picton have also shown steady growth during the year bringing our total membership close to 50.

Our efforts in holding a 'Traveller' series and ensuring the sharing of our major South Island events across the wider region has obviously paid off in raising the profile of the Zephyr and giving us keen devotees of this great little boat some great experiences and fun.

Looking forward, the team organising the 24-25 Traveller Series have some great ideas to improve further on this model and while still finalising some details this will be able to be shared soon together with our local S.I. sailing calendar of events.

The 23-24 season was a busy one for us, as well as organising the Traveller Series and running the region's main championship events we also, as an association, hosted the Zephyr Nationals down at Naval Point Club Lyttelton early February 24. This was well supported with 60 boats from across New Zealand entered and while the 'normal' easterly sailing breezes took some time to eventuate, we got some great racing in with a variety of conditions, all with their particular challenges. It was great to see the South Island entries performing well, with a number of us featuring in the top 10 placings. Other main events were: -

#### Canterbury Champs.

A series of nine races held during the season and spread across three local Christchurch clubs.

Winner of this for 23-24 was Hamish Wilcox. #101.

#### **South Island Champs.**

With the growth of boats in the top of the south, we are now sharing this event between Canterbury. Nelson and Marlborough. The 23-24 series was hosted by Queen Charlotte Yacht Club early December and was another well-run event, although unfortunately day two was blown out, so three races only. Graeme Henry #160 was the winner of this series.

#### **Traveller Series.**

This trophy is managed to ensure both those who regularly attend as well as those who place well can be rewarded and this year Don LePage in #256 won through both great placings and very regular attendance.

Finally, I must recognise the strong camaraderie that has been a feature in this past season amongst our sailors and supporters. The willingness of so many to pitch in assist with events, organising coaching and tuning events and assisting each other with boat maintenance, both minor and significant, has been a standout for me and something that makes our fleet so special.

## **NELSON / PICTON—Graeme Henry**

The local Nelson Zephyr fleet of six boats had a very sporadic Nelson YC attendance with some regular sailors out of NZ or in the North Island.

Tony Walker purchased Jetstream from David Gilles at the end of the season, so Nelson now has seven Zephyrs and we're expecting more regular attendance at Nelson YC this season. Nelson has the ILCA Nationals in January 2025 so there is some focus on this event with Hannes training up in an ILCA.

There is interest for Nelson YC to host the Nationals in 2028 so this future possibility will be good for the class development.

The Picton fleet of five Zephyrs with Nikki Rolton owning two and her husband Dave sailing one of the boats in the coming season.

We're looking forward to the South Island Champs early November being held out of Pigeon Bay, Banks Peninsula.

#### **WELLINGTON – John Kliffen**

Overall, the 23/24 season was a mixed bag with some typically windy or blown out spring race days mixed with tranquil light weather to test sailor's skills across a full spread of conditions.

The 23/24 WBBC Zephyr Championship Series at WBBC was comfortably won again by Greg Wright #190, with Brett Linton #303 in 2nd, Glenn Tassicker #89 3<sup>rd</sup>, Nigel Lloyd #6 4th and John Kliffen #609 in 5th place. The 23/24 WBBC Zephyr Handicap Championship was won by Heather Garside #312, with Nigel Lloyd #6 in 2nd and Greg Wright #190 in 3rd place

in the overall season handicap results.

Greg Wright #190 also won the Line championship for the WBBC Autumn series, and Andrew Mackay #168 won the Handicap championship for the WBBC Autumn series.

Although the weather didn't help the schedule, Phil Williams ran another great coaching clinic at WBBC for up to eight sailors in preparation for the 2024 Zephyr Nationals in Lyttelton.

#### 2023/24 Plimmerton BC Zephyr Season Summary

Approximately seven Zephyrs are sailing at PBC

PBC hosted the 2024 Wellington Centreboard Championships on 16-17 March 24, which was also attended by several WBBC Zephyrs.

#### **Wellington Sailors at 2024 Zephyr Nationals**

A keen group of 11 Wellington sailors travelled to Lyttelton to compete at the 2024 Zephyr National Championships. Everyone really enjoyed the relaxed Lyttelton vibe and Naval Point's friendly club atmosphere. John Fletcher particularly enjoyed returning to Naval Point as it was 50 years since he competed in his last Zephyr nationals at this same location!! Congratulations to Greg Wright on achieving 3rd place overall in a very competitive fleet of 59 entries, and Amanda Hargreaves who again won the Women's trophy (13th place overall). Polly Wright and Joanna Kempers were 2nd and 3rd women respectively. Greg Wright also won the Townson Trophy (1st Townson built Zephyr). Greg teamed up with daughter Polly Wright to win the Whanau Trophy. John Kliffen won the Handicap Trophy and Keith Fraser also raced very well, achieving 14th place overall and was a very close 2nd on handicap.

#### **HAMILTON / TAURANGA – Hansie**

The Tauranga fleet have been a bit smaller than normal during the past year. We welcomed Phil Rogers to the fleet with #212. For the summer series we had between four to ten boats on any race day. We have a few kiwi fruit and dairy farmers and often sailing comes second during busy farming times. Patrick McDaniel is forever working on his boat, apparently making it a rocket ship. Mark Thomas sometimes comes for a beer after sailing with weird excuses why he didn't sail. Bob Smyth says it's cold. For the winter series we had between four and seven boats on race days. There were a few cancelled race days with either too much or too little wind, but also some perfect days for sailing. The races were generally won by Andy on heavier days and Hansie on lighter days. Ian Watson had a run in with a circular saw and fingertips were the losers. He missed a lot of the races but lent his boat to Jess Smyth who proved the boat is not slow. She 'chicked' the boys in some of the races. There is a rumour that Bob might lend her his boat for the 2025 nationals to be held in Tauranga.

Tauranga sailors attended the North Island regatta - four boats, nationals - five boats and Auckland champs - four boats. For the Tauranga regatta we had 17 entries with the help from the Auckland fleet who support our regatta every year. The regatta was won by Steve Pyatt.

Tauranga entries in ZOA regattas are very high if you consider the total number of sailors in our fleet.

The Tauranga sailors would love to send you a warm invite to the next nationals to be held by us. We guarantee great club facilities, good launching area, race area close to launching, high tide, cold beer, fair wind and sunny days.

#### **AUCKLAND – Tim Willets**

After a few difficult Covid seasons, it now appears we're coming back to more normal Zephyr sailing and can look forward to a great season ahead.

The AZO has around 50 members, which is about the same as the past few years. In our regular AZO club racing we're seeing around 30-40 members sailing on a regular or semi-regular basis. Our Summer Series attracted 31 competitors sailing in the 48 races from September to April. This was a close series with results decided on the last two races. Manly Sailing Club hosted this year's Auckland Champs which was well attended with 31 boats including 4 from Tauranga and 1 from Nelson. The result came down to a match race in the last race between Mark Orams and Rod Dawson. Good to see Rod give Mark a real hurry up. It was also really great to see Sara Winther borrow Andrew Brown's new #328 for a very solid third overall.

Auckland Champs: Mark Orams, Rod Dawson, Sara Winther

Ten Auckland boats sailed in the Tauranga Regatta. Moving forward to 2024/25, it has been decided to run both the Auckland Champs and Tauranga Regatta within a few weeks of each other to encourage participation by out-of-town boats in both regattas.

Lake Taupo North Islands attracted 30 entries with 19 from Auckland. Fabulous turnout after a couple of years at Napier. Bit of a light wind affair. Placings: Grant Beck, Greg Wright, Andrew Mikkelsen

The Zephyr Nationals at Lyttelton were totally dominated by Mark Orams and it was a great delight as AZO President

to have a very strong showing of 12 Auckland Boats with four of the first six.

This was a massive effort by Team Auckland with seven Zephyrs transported to the event thanks to a rental truck arranged by Robin Simpson of Hydraulink. The AZO did offset the cost of the truck and I believe it was AZO money well spent. For my part I took great delight in driving both ways over 32 hours in total but it was well worth it. I'm really hoping the Wellington, Nelson and Christchurch boats will all reciprocate when Auckland hosts the 70<sup>th</sup> Nationals Jubilee Year in 2026.

The AZO are looking forward to a bumper Zephyr season in which we hope to see all 50 of our members race their boats at least three race events. We are also looking forward to good numbers attending all out-of-town regattas.

#### 2025 Nationals

Hansie Eichholz advised planning for the Tauranga nationals was on track, 4-8 March 2025.

#### **Yachting NZ Survey**

YNZ are surveying classes to gauge support for various tweaks to national championship requirements. Triggered by the ZOA seeking a reduction to a minimum four races, which was declined - YNZ policy is to not give individual class dispensations. The ZOA case was based on climate change weather variability and potential no-result nationals. Consequently, YNZ are reviewing their entire section covering nationals. ZOA's application came from the Sailors Forum at our recent Lyttelton champs and was endorsed by the Exec. YNZ will advise classes of their policy decision.

#### **Female National Champion**

In YNZ's comms to ZOA, it was noted the 2024 nationals had five female entrants, one less than the required six to permit awarding title of Female National Champion. The class was invited to apply, with justifying reasons, for a dispensation. Secretary supplied compelling reasons why Amanda Hargreaves should be recognised by YNZ as the 2024 Zephyr Female National Champion. Awaiting reply.

#### **Halyard Locks**

Currently the majority of Zephyrs sail with YNZ safety regs non-compliant halyard locks. Sailors Forum previously requested posting compliant option descriptions/imagery on class website. Secretary to action.

#### **Nationals Travel Subsidy**

It was re-affirmed that the ZOA individual subsidy of \$100 per boat will apply to South Island entrants attending the 2025 Tauranga nationals.

The calibre in the top four at the 2024 Auckland Champs were absolutely second to none in terms of recent Zephyr contests we've run. We got very tricky conditions and for the contest to come down to the last race with both boats tied for first equal after five races really speaks volumes for the high standard.

It was great to see Mark Orams get some real competition and Rod Dawson back out sailing. Down the last run on the last race, these two were absolutely neck and neck and sailed all over the harbour to try to decide the winner. It was an epic end to an epic Auckland Championships.

Also, the fantastic third place performance put up by Sara Winther in a borrowed boat was truly awesome. I cannot believe how fast Sara is off the wind, it was obvious she was a top Laser sailor by the seamless way she got the best out of the Zephyr downwind - she had a fantastic series. I couldn't believe how in race one she was last boat off the start line and went down the two reaches passing at least 12 boats and ended up 6<sup>th</sup>. It was a comeback Lazarus would be proud of. She also had a couple of great races where she was right in the mix at the very front.

We were also very lucky to have Giles Grigg out in Brian's 701 coming in 6<sup>th</sup> in very fine style, also showing downwind prowess from the Lasers. Throw Grant and Steve in the mix in a wide variety of conditions and it made for a very competitive contest where conditions were so very tricky there was no-one spared from at least one or two shockers.. Hansie Eichholz was the winner of the Handicap trophy.


